ocal community transport organisations serving the Londonderry electorate will receive \$52,000 - an increase of almost 35 per cent – in State Government funding this financial year, Londonderry MP Bart Bassett has announced.

The funding boost comes after the NSW Government committed an extra \$12 million over four years to community transport organisations across the State through the Community Transport Program.

and people who live in isolated communities because it helps them maintain their links with their local community," Mr Bassett said.

"Thousands of volunteers across the State do fantastic work to improve the lives of those disadvantaged people who need transport services to maintain a normal life," Transport Minister Ms Berejiklian said.
